



Key findings

In our first public poll of the presidential race <u>in collaboration with Guardian US</u>, Opinium surveyed 2,000 US adults 18+ between June 19th and 24rd. The survey was conducted online and weighted to represent the US adult population according to demographics, education and past voting behavior. Here's what we found—


State of the race

Biden leads Trump by 12 among likely voters

Among those who are registered to vote and indicate that they are 10/10 certain to vote in November's election, former Vice President Joe Biden leads President Donald Trump by 52% to 40%.

52% of Americans disapprove of the job Donald Trump is doing as president while 36% approve.






In contrast to the gender gap in voting intention, men and women give Trump similar approval scores: 35% of women approve vs. 37% of men, 53% of women disapprove vs. 51% of men.

In contrast, approval of Joe Biden is more mixed. While being the presumptive Democratic nominee is not a "job" as such, we asked whether people approved or disapproved of how the former vice president is handling being the nominee. Overall 41% approved while 38% disapproved.

Biden also leads among those who dislike both candidates

The approval figures mirror the favorability scores each candidate has, with Biden viewed almost evenly (40% favorable vs. 38% unfavorable) and Trump's figures similar to his job approval (35% favorable, 51% unfavorable).

Views of Vice President Mike Pence are more mixed, as are views of the leaders of the House and Senate.



However, the real purpose behind this question is to identify those who are unfavorable to both Trump and Biden. Among those with an unfavorable view of both candidates but are still 10/10 likely to vote in November, Biden leads Trump by 37% to 14% with 26% voting for third party candidates and 23% answering "don't know".

Democrats lead by 8 in generic ballot

47% of registered voters would vote for the Democratic candidate in their district if elections to the House of Representatives were held tomorrow while 39% would vote for the Republican.

By 3 to 1 Americans say the country is divided

70% say that the United States is either completely (21%) or mostly (49%) divided vs. 23% who believe the country is either mostly (20%) or completely (3%) united.




Majorities of both parties feel this way although the feeling is stronger among Democrats (79%) than Republicans (63%).

Bolton's book has further entrenched political division along party lines but has discouraged independents from voting for Trump

The book has made 25% of Registered Republicans more likely to vote for Trump and only 9% less likely to vote for him. On the other side of the aisle, the book has made 17% of Registered Democrats less likely to vote for Trump.

However, the majority of Americans have either not heard anything about John Bolton's book (17%) or say it has not changed their likelihood of voting for Donald Trump (54%).

Does Bolton's book make you more/less likely to vote for Donald Trump in the presidential eleciton?




Coronavirus update

Americans still rate their state's response higher than the federal government

Views of the federal response have turned negative since April and, while views of respondents' state governments' responses remain net positive, they have become significantly more negative in the intervening months.

Americans think combatting coronavirus should take priority over the economy


By 53% to 32% Americans say that the priority should be "Saving as many lives as possible from coronavirus regardless of the impact on the economy" over "Restoring jobs and getting the economy back up and running regardless of the risks from coronavirus".
